VADA Shel Gafford Memorial Award for EXCELLENCE IN SPORTMANSHIP

Nomination deadline for 2019 Awards: December 1, 2019

For anyone not fortunate enough to have known Shel, he was not only a gifted horseman and successful competitor, but also a truly good sport and dedicated advocate to VADA. Shel was a seasoned competitor, having won the Gold and Silver Individual Medals in his last two years as a Young Rider at the NAYRC. He always rode to win, but never at the expense of his horse or another rider. Rather than "psyching" his fellow competitors, Shel was more likely to offer a helping hand or wish them luck. Furthermore, Shel was a tireless supporter of VADA. He served as President during some of our Association's most difficult and trying times. It is largely due to his diplomacy and tenacity that VADA exists as it does today.

It is this spirit of unselfish good sportsmanship and generous volunteerism, which were so much a part of Shel's nature, that VADA wishes to encourage and reward. If you are aware of a VADA member who is: 1) Actively involved in any aspect of competition and/or VADA activities (eg. Rider, owner, trainer, coach, show mom/dad, spouse, offspring, VADA Board Member, VADA volunteer), 2) who consistently exhibits the characteristics of good sportsmanship and unselfish support of VADA, and 3) has not received the Shel Gafford award within the past 10 years, please nominate that person for the Shel Gafford Award. Include in your nomination the person's name, chapter affiliation, and a brief statement (200 words or less) explaining why you feel your nominee is deserving of this award.

Nominations must be received by December 1st. The slate of nominations will be sent to the President of each Chapter, who shall, using the method they determine, poll the members of their Chapter and select their Chapter's choice for the award. In the event of a tie, the VADA Board of Directors shall select the winning nominee from the two candidates. Chapters MUST report their selections to Sheli King no later than January 15. The recipient will be notified that he/she will receive an award at the VADA banquet in February and will be encouraged to attend. The recipient will receive a special award and a check for \$250.00.

My horses are all family members and I would never consider selling any of them. I have had horses in the past that have been better off with other people, so I understand that sometimes you have to do what is best for the horse and forget your own feelings for these beautiful creatures who give us so much pleasure. I am on the fence about these "retirement" homes for horses. I, personally, am fortunate enough to have a farm of my own where I can let my horses live out their lives knowing they are loved every day. I think some horses need more human hugging than others; my horses Stinky, Budster, Toman and Bow are like that. The others like me but don't crave my attention all the time. Which comes to who I have interacted with most. Budster is my go to Cavalry horse. Toman is a big baby who thinks he is human. Bow knows he died and went to heaven when I rescued him from the slaughter pens and the Amish. Stinky, well... he IS human and we have a special bond.

My niece is the only other horseman in the family that rides and she boarded her beautiful Arabian gelding even when he was too old to ride. He was her partner and the love of her life. I think when I see posts about "Gee, gotta get a new horse as mine is too old to compete; know any place I can stash him?", it bothers me a bit. I guess I just believe that like any other family member, my horses are also for life. I have some who can't be ridden but they are family and cost me feed, bedding, vet bills, farrier bills. I know I could not do this no matter how well they were treated or taken care of. Because I, too, believe that I am a part of their lives just as much as they are part of mine. When I go to the fence and call a name in the dark, I see faces turn and a thunder of hooves to me. Is it for the treats? Maybe that is the initial attraction, but when I don't have anything but love to give them, they don't walk away and again, the next time they come to me. So I think that they, like my other pets, would miss me if I was to send them away to strangers. I think they would feel that the head mare had deserted them.

Anyone can learn The Masterson Method on a basic level. It doesn't require knowledge of anatomy. It doesn't take physical strength. It can deepen the bond between horse and human. For sport horses, it is a way to improve performance, but the bonus is that it opens up new levels of communication and develops the horse's trust.

Jim Masterson is the author of multiple books and the producer of

many instructional videos on equine bodywork. He was the official massage therapist for 2006-2014 for USET. His goal has always been to give back to the horse and provide opportunities in all countries and cultures for humans to do the same. Jim offers a credentialing program as well.

By learning the basic techniques of Masterson Method® (MM) integrated approach to equine bodywork, riders can assist the horse in actively participating in the process of releasing tension. This method of listening through touch and giving the gift of gentle bodywork to horses provides riders an opportunity to gain self-awareness, a sense of mindful presence, & increased connection with their horse while he/she relaxes deeply. A relaxed state will maximize learning.

According to the pyramid of equine training, you must begin by establishing rhythm in your ride and then progressively develop your horse's relaxation, connection, impulsion, straightness, and collection. Without relaxation from your partner in the arena, hope for collection, straightness, etc. is limited.

This technique offers a way to improve the training of both rider and horse, on the ground and mounted. As an added bonus the vast majority of horses demonstrate obvious enjoyment during sessions. They appear relaxed as their nervous system processes the release of fascial adhesions causing tightness, instability, asymmetry and more. They often pursue more of the technique by following the rider around and showing relaxed, affectionate touch. Oftentimes, other horses in separate stalls or pastures will come as close to the session as possible and sometimes releasing as well. Think: flight animal herd dynamic.

Science

Over fifteen MM techniques offer physical tension releases in two major junctions: Poll/Atlas and Hind end. These areas of tension could be caused by confirmation, workload, rider imbalances, previous

injuries, etc. In MM through very light touch in certain areas the horse is asked a question in a way that flight animals understand best: Do you have tension here...or here? Ways in which the horses may respond can be eye blinks, heavy eyelids, twitchy or quivering lips, head lowered, and stillness among others. If a rider observes these "answers", continued light touch in that area can produce lasting results. The horse may do nothing visible indicating that it is internally bracing, a sympathetic nervous system response to protect itself. Depending on the horse's current status of stress, most often this touch in a specific area

will trigger a bypass of the horse's sympathetic response. In this case, the horse may answer the question of tension with a physical release of that tension with various movements: Weight shifting, yawning, head shaking, snorting, neck/back arching, eyelid rolling, sighing, licking/chewing, along with other responses. This process will result in a very deep level of relaxation.

The beauty of MM is that basic techniques can be taught to riders to do with their own horses on an as needed basis to continue benefits without cost. Most frequently MM is recommended, again depending on the particular horse, to begin with three sessions per week for two weeks then twice weekly for a week then once weekly as needed. It is not uncommon to have a rider report after one session that they achieved their first flying lead change in months, or that the horse's bascule was significantly improved, or that the horse was in general much more willing during rides. Even that girthiness disappeared. In the end, any opportunity to spend quality time with your partner is time well spent.



This light touch, in very specific areas, prompts a neurological response. Think about when horses groom one another, especially on the withers, how relaxed they look. Think about how the entire running herd can take a sudden left turn simultaneously without any obvious communication or signals being passed from one to another. A flight animal's incredible sensitivity to it's surroundings ensure it's survival.

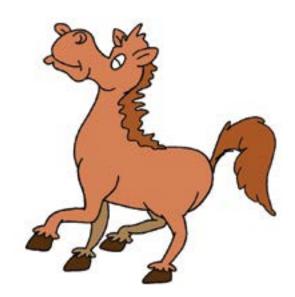

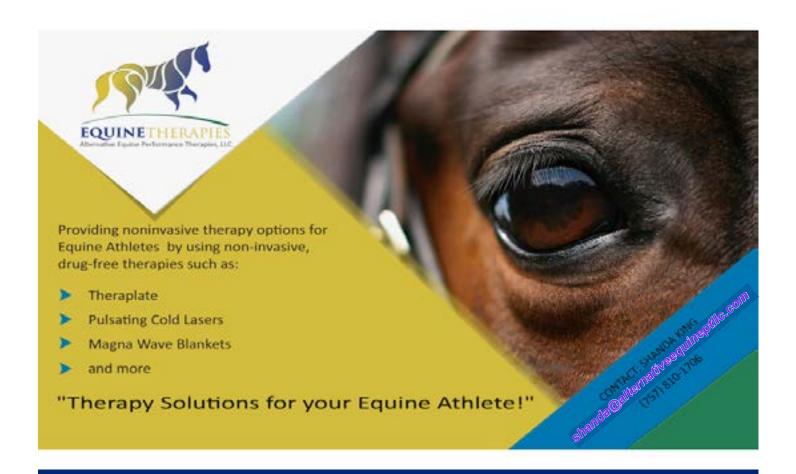
